1. Summer & Fall Operations

As the vaccine rollout continues across the state, many of us are still left with more questions than answers regarding what the coming months will look like for in-person activities and COVID-19 safety guidelines. MFSI will continue to follow all policies and guidelines set forth by SMCC, the broader Maine Community College System, and the CDC.



2. AFG Grant Update

In case you missed it: MFSI recently signed a contract with Drager to construct our third SCBA Air Management trailer! The anticipated timeline for delivery is to receive the trailer late this summer, and then provide training opportunities as soon as possible. Anyone that would like to use this new piece of equipment will need to attend a Train-the-Trainer on its setup and use. 3. The Importance of Training Documentation

Many of you know that the MFSI team tends to have a "packrat" mentality. We have training records on file that date back into the 1980s - far beyond what we are legally required to keep, in terms of the mandatory timeline for records retention. And as mentioned in prior reports, we have been working to digitize these archives so that they will be further protected from the damage that can occur to paper files over time.

As we progress on this task, I wanted to bring attention to the importance of documentation of training in accordance with Maine State Law, Bureau of Labor Standards rules, and NFPA

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1401: *Recommended Practice for Fire Service Training Reports and Records*. I cannot stress enough the importance of proper documentation of training activities. If I could give anyone in the Maine fire service my own personal advice, it would be: make sure you keep a copy of all documentation for your own records. Make sure it is true and valid, and will stand up to strict scrutiny. Society has become extremely litigious - as such, fire training professionals must be hyper vigilant with documentation. We like to say that if a training event is not recorded by proper means, then it did not occur.

We encourage everyone to look into the Maine State record retention laws in order to keep your record management up to date. Here is a great article on the subject: <u>How to Build</u> <u>NFPA 1401 Compliant Training Records | Emergency Reporting</u>. Our office will do all we can to help in any way we can.

4. Written & Skills Tests

The skills testing season is upon us, and preparation for June skills exams is currently underway. The first test was conducted on April 25 at the Yarmouth Fire Training Facility - the photos below were taken by Director Graves during the exam. We would like to congratulate all that have successfully passed the test and are (or are close to being) Certified Fire Fighters in Maine. We are all very proud of your efforts.

We continue to administer written exams as well, primarily at our offices in Brunswick, although we have added a secondary location in the Bangor area in order to meet demand. Please visit our <u>website</u> for test dates and the most current information on COVID-19 guidelines.







5. MFSI 2021-2025 Strategic Plan

This sentiment is at the heart of our newly developed 2021-2025 Strategic Plan. The



document contains a great deal of information about the organization itself, and the history of how and why MFSI exists today - but also a detailed list of what our goals are for MFSI's future, and an outline of areas that we intend to focus on over the next few years.

A draft of the Strategic Plan has been shared with our Advisory Committee and will be discussed at the next committee meeting on June 4, 2021.

MFSI and the Maine Fire Chiefs' Association recently partnered in an official agreement to revamp, revise and update this very valuable training program to Maine's Fire Chiefs and Chief Officers. The program is invaluable and provides the attendee a comprehensive understanding of important information such as:

- Financial Management & Planning
- Coaching, Counseling & Correcting
- Training Safety & Risk Management
- Incident Management

The program is taught by State of Maine Fire Chiefs, with years of experience and knowledge of fire service management in every aspect of the job today. MFSI strongly supports this program and it can be requested by a Chief Officer by going to the Maine Fire Service Institute's <u>website</u> and placing a course request. We will then put you in contact with a Maine Fire Chiefs' Association Representative to organize the particulars of the program. Together we can make a brighter future for the Maine Fire Service in its entirety and better serve the people of the great State of Maine. - Setting up a uniform standard for our instructors
- Spearheading the redesign of the MFSI website
- Realigning job descriptions for key staff members to better reflect current operations
- Assisting with the improvements of many administrative processes within MFSI

She was best known for having a smiling face at our programs and interacting with our guests during programs offered here at MFSI. She always made sure folks enjoyed their time with us during fire training events.

To our instructors, Melissa was a key support person who answered their questions, helped with contracts and other paperwork, and ensured they had the meals and lodging they would require as they visited communities throughout Maine.

8. LD242 - An Act to Support the Maine Fire Protection Services Commission

By now, most of you have no doubt become acquainted with LD242, an act designed to ensure that:

- Live Fire Training Facilities are geographically located across Maine
- Quality training is readily available for more distant and rural firefighters
- Equitable training & testing is provided by fire instructors and training agencies
- Local resources are leveraged to maximize return on State taxpayer investments

10. Recruitment

MFSI is considering another instructor hiring process which would potentially take place in the fall of 2021. This is in the very early stages of discussion at this point. We may be specifically seeking out instructors in geographical areas where we have the greatest need, as we are sometimes faced with difficulty finding instructors in certain counties. Again, this is very preliminary - but if you have someone from your department that is a go-getter and you feel would greatly benefit the needs of MFSI, please let us know!

MFSI Instructors have access to a wealth of resources via the online Instructor Portal, which went live in 2019 with the generous support of SMCC's I.T. department.

11. National Fire Academy Program Planning

Unfortunately, MFSI was forced to cancel the April offering of F0602 - Shaping the Future due to low enrollment. However, F0646 - Leadership in Supervision: Creating Environments for Professional Growth went ahead as planned and was very well attended - many thanks to all who helped make this possible!

Due to difficulty in securing an NFA instructor with the current travel restrictions, we have had to postpone the planned 6-day "N0312 Command & Control of Fire Department Operations at Target Hazards" which was originally scheduled for this month.

Planning is underway for our fall offering of National Fire Academy Programs, to take place either in Bangor or Brunswick (TBD). The programs are as follows:

- Fire Investigations
- Leadership in Supervision: Perspectives in Thinking

12. Fire & Emergency Services Instructor I & II Hybrid Program
