1. Fire Officer I & II 2020 Update

The NFPA 1021 Standard for Professional Fire Officer Qualifications has changed and MFSI will be at work to upgrade the program and get it out as soon as we can. We have been meeting with the build-out team to get the online program up to speed and make adjustments to the delivery model - at some point in late fall 2022, we should be ready to go live with this new program. We are incredibly grateful for all of the staff, State Fire Instructors, and subject matter experts who have helped make this possible. A tremendous amount of behind-the-scenes work goes into a transition of this nature and we couldn't do it without all of your support.



2. NFA In-State Weekend

This year's NFA In-State Weekend is being planned for September 17 & 18, 2022, at MFSI headquarters in Brunswick, as well as a free course in Ellsworth. The following programs will be offered:

3. Ventilation Prop



The new Ventilation Prop has been ordered and we anticipate that it will be delivered this fall, barring any delays.

This prop was purchased via grant funding and will be provided by FireVent, LLC. FireVent is the leading manufacturer of mobile and stationary ventilation training props for the fire service.

4. Class B Foam Issue

Please see our recent <u>memo</u> on the legal issues surrounding the use of Class B foam during fire training. MFSI is working on responsible ways to meet the objectives in NFPA 1001 and 1002 Standards while best protecting Maine's citizens and environment.

5. Car Fire Prop - Out of Service

Due to unforeseen complications, our Car Fire Prop will be out of service for longer than anticipated. The prop's electronic gas control system has failed and will need to be completely replaced, which will take some time due to the current situation of commerce in the U.S. today. We'll keep everyone apprised of any developments as soon as they become available, including the date that we anticipate having the prop back in circulation.



6. New SCBA Air Confidence Trailer (Red Maze)

We are thrilled to announce that our new SCBA Air Confidence Training Trailer (aka the "Red Maze") has arrived and folks are already being trained on its use. Our staff participated in a fantastic initial Train-the-Trainer event with a representative from Draeger, and the prop itself will be ready for action soon.

Our current next steps are to transport it out to four locations for a second round of Trainthe-Trainer sessions, with the intent of covering different geographical areas so that this prop can be utilized as much as possible throughout the state. We will share additional details about these training opportunities as soon as they are finalized.







7. Transition to Online Testing | QuestionMark

A team of MFSI staff and State Fire Instructors recently participated in a two-day training with a representative from QuestionMark, the software that we will be using to transition to paperless written exams. QuestionMark is a very robust and user-friendly testing platform, with extensive reporting options, and we can't wait to get the new system fully implemented.

Many aspects of our written testing process will remain exactly the same - there will still be a live proctor in the room with all candidates, for example, and we will still be using PTS as our source for test banks - but there are also many advantages and improvements that come with switching to an online delivery method.

We look forward to sharing more updates with you all as they become available! And of course, one of our top priorities will be ensuring that all test-takers, program coordinators, proctors, and other stakeholders have all the tools & information that they need for success.

8. National Fire Academy 6 Day

The 6-Day NFA program in May was a great success. Firefighters and Fire Officers from all over Maine worked with two NFA facilitators to make the Leadership in Supervision program run smoothly. We want to thank the two NFA Instructors for providing a solid learning experience for the students, as well as a special thank you to the Town of Topsham, Fire Rescue Chief McLaughlin, and Topsham's crews, for their support and for allowing us to utilize their training room for this week-long event.





9. Oxford County Basic Pumps Program

MFSI recently delivered one of the largest Basic Pumps programs to date, with 30+candidates from all over Oxford County at the Fryeburg Fairgrounds. We had a great time in the Western Mountains of Maine with all the good people of that region.

- August TBD, Ellsworth Fire Training Facility
- October 16th, Bangor Fire Training Facility
- December 22nd, Yarmouth Fire Training Facility

Altogether, these exams will provide opportunities for over 250 firefighters to achieve ProBoard Certification.

14. Recent damage to MFSI Props and Equipment

Folks, we wish to see all our props remain available to assist and support fire training efforts around Maine. However, many of these props have recently sustained significant damage and will require repair and/or be taken fully out of service due to the damage. We simply ask you to do all you can to prevent damage and see that the prop is returned in good order. We know and realize things happen; kindly call or email Support Services Manager, Ray Bishop, of any issues or damage as soon as possible. Our concern is that if our equipment is not utilized with proper care, we may not be able to sustain some of the props we have in the future. We appreciate your continued cooperation on this matter.

15. Live Fire Training Facilities Engineering Inspections

MFSI and the Maine Fire Protection Services Commission collaborated to have seven regional fire training facilities inspected by a licensed engineer in accordance with the NFPA 1403 Standard on Live Fire Training Evolutions. This will also support efforts to improve and increase our statewide capacity in that end. 18. Maine Fire Service Icon Retires

Steve Willis's name is synonymous with fire training and education here in Maine: a pioneer of Maine's fire service who wrote training safety techniques that became national standards is retiring. Steve Willis is the chairman of Southern Maine Community College's Fire Science Department. He has spent 40 years coordinating the program to train hopeful and inservice firefighters to get their associates degrees. The program is 54 years old. "I've seen our program grow



from just 6 full-time students when I was a student to 120 students," Willis said during a speech at his retirement celebration. SMCC's website describes the program as focused "on developing skills in comprehensive approaches to fire protection that utilize cost-effective proactive, reactive, and management methods. The ultimate goal is to help the student develop the appropriate skills and knowledge for professional fire protection." All of us wish Steve the very best in retirement. We thank you, sir, for all you have done.
