THE BUGLE'S ECHO

This issue is dedicated in memory of six FDNY firefighters that died in the line of duty at the Sefu Soap and Fat Company on Friday evening, October 26, 1962, in Maspeth, Queens NY: Captain William Russell; Engine 325, Firefighter James Marino; Engine 325, Firefighter Richard Andrews; Engine 325, Firefighter George Zahn; Engine 238, Firefighter Richard Gifford; Engine 238, Firefighter Francis Egan; Ladder 115

The two-story brick building, which stood on 56th Road, measured 73-by-50-ft. and housed large tanks used for rendering fat to make soap. The fire was reported shortly after 9pm. A firefighter on the first-arriving ladder company recalls the heavy fire they encountered at the scene. Winds fanned the flames and the fire quickly escalated to four alarms.

For almost two hours, firefighters battled the intense heat and smoke created by the burning fat and chemicals. The fire was declared under control at around 10:50 pm. But then, without warning, the right-side wall began to buckle. A cry went up from the loading dock but was cut short by the crash. In an instant, twenty firefighters were buried under six feet of debris that had been the wall in front of them. Some of the firefighters closest to the wall were saved by a corrugated metal shed adjacent to the building, while the firefighters furthest away took the brunt of the wall as it fell.



Command sounded a fifth alarm, bringing more equipment and firefighters to the scene to help with the rescue and recovery efforts. Trucks brought lumber in to shore up the building in order to help firefighters free their trapped comrades.

After the collapse, some firefighters crawled or were helped to safety—but six firefighters died as a result of their injuries. Source link. May they rest in peace.

LETTER FROM MFSI DIRECTOR GRAVES

MFSI remains extremely busy with positive programs moving forward and even more being planned for the future. I want to share a little passion with you, so bear with me, this is about vision, dreams, and reality.

As Director, I have set many goals for MFSI and for the Maine Fire Service. We've made real progress in several areas, but sometimes it feels like building a sandcastle, what we build is strong, but the tide is always pushing against us. That's where MFSI stands today. We cannot deliver *more* until additional resources, in the form of personnel, are provided. Maine's fire service leadership understands this, and we are working to move the needle. I ask you to trust us and trust the system. If you want to play a part, educate yourself, get involved with your stakeholder group, and join the fight for professional improvement. Work for the greater good, not just individual gain.

It's time to raise our collective game. Mainers expect us to be there in their darkest hour. Firefighters need the right training to meet that call. And if there's one thing I know about Mainers, it's that we will find a path, even in the darkest and most unnavigated woods. Our resolve is stronger than ever. Imagine a Pro Board Driver Operator Program, Pro Board Fire Officer III, and more. Imagine a system of Fire Officer professional development that raises the bar higher than we've ever seen in Maine.

This is not a pipe dream; it is within reach. But it will take all of us pulling for the greater good. Together, we can build something lasting, something Mainers can be proud of when the alarm sounds. Stay safe, we need all of you out there.

This online, instructor-led (live) delivery is presented via ZOOM for two consecutive days. No more than five (5) applications from the same agency will be accepted for an individual offering.




HIGH RATE OF CANCELLATIONS FROM NFA PARTICIPANTS

- · Command Under Fire: Leadership, lawsuits, and personal liability





IMPORTANT UPDATES TO FIREFIGHTER TRAINING AND CERTIFICATION

Two major changes have recently taken place in firefighter training and education:

1) The National Fire Protection Association issued **NFPA 1010**, Standard on Professional Qualifications for Firefighters. This standard officially took effect on January 10, 2024, and Pro Board accredited agencies have two years to update their programs.

2) In May 2024, Jones & Bartlett released the 5th edition of Fundamentals of Firefighter Skills and Hazardous Materials Response. This text remains the foundation of MFSI's firefighter training curriculum. In response to these changes, MFSI has been working toward Pro Board reaccreditation for Firefighter I & II – which includes:

- Updating curriculum to align with NFPA 1010
- · Reviewing & clarifying skill objectives for accuracy
- Reviewing over 300 new written exam questions
- Vetting all questions with subject-matter-experts.
- Building new exams on our online testing platform.

The goal is to have all supporting documentation submitted, reviewed, and approved by Pro Board so that beginning in 2026, all firefighter programs will test to the new NFPA 1010 Standard.

Important: Any firefighter program starting now, with the intent to test in the next testing season, must use the 5th edition of Jones & Bartlett.


Upcoming Coordinator/Instructor Meeting

- Certified Fire Instructor I

Preferred Qualifications:

- Fire Instructor II
- Fire Officer I & II
- · Incident Safety Officer

VFIS EVDT Training Update

MFSI has successfully reviewed VFIS's curriculum modifications for the 2024 EVDT update. comprehensive review involved collaboration with VFIS Education staff, instructor training exercises, two pilot classes, and the creation of a list of suggested adaptations for MFSI's course administration and delivery.

- Training Process for State Fire Instructors: MFSI will initiate a 30-day training period for State Fire Instructors to familiarize them with the updated administration processes and course delivery changes. This training will take place before the full transition to the 2024 curriculum begins in early November.
- Collaboration with Local Instructors: Local and regional municipal instructors will also be invited to trainings to ensure they understand how the changes may impact municipal EVDT programs.
- **Communication**: MFSI will actively communicate with regional training associations, Chief's Associations, and local departments, as well as MFSI instructors, regarding updates in course administration and the new Learning Management System (LMS).

It is important to note that VFIS requires current instructors to complete the online EVDT Instructor updates from VFIS University to teach the new curriculum. For further information, please contact MFSI TPM Chris Azevedo.

This Train-the-Trainer program, conducted by VFIS, is recommended but not mandatory for instructors already certified as VFIS EVDT instructors. FIRE OFFICER I

Programs are underway in Aroostook County (Presque Isle). Applications Open Nov 14 for **Cumberland County (Scarborough) and Penobscot** County (Bangor).

FIRE OFFICER II ACADEMY

Preparations are underway for the 2026 State Fire Officer Academy. We have received feedback indicating that many are unable to attend a week-long program, so considerations for a new format to better support Maine's volunteer firefighters is being considered. The MFSI Model offers an intensive and immersive learning experience that fosters peer-to-peer interaction. This approach allows officers from different departments to share their experiences and solutions. MFSI collaborates with various state agencies, such as the Maine Forest Service and the State Fire Marshal, to ensure candidates can train in scenarios specific to Maine.

FIRE OFFICER III, IV, AND ISO

The following programs are Pro Board certified and taught by RAFT at MFSI HQ in Brunswick. Fire Officer III - May 18-21, 2026 Fire Officer IV - December 8,9 & 10, 2025 Incident Safety Officer - March 16 & 17, 2026 Register through RAFT.

FIRE & EMERGENCY SERVICES INSTRUCTOR I & II

Both Penobscot and Cumberland County programs filled beyond capacity. Both programs have kicked off and are rolling forward with all candidates engaged. Applications Open Nov 14 for Franklin County (Farmington) and another location TBA.

PROTECTION SERVICES COMMISSION

NEWS FROM THE MAINE FIRE

On Monday, September 7, the Maine Fire Protection Services Commission met at Public Safety Headquarters in Augusta. The meeting was highly productive and highlighted important progress being made in support of the Maine Fire Service. Some key highlights include:

Cancer Prevention Funding: Over \$200,000 in grant funds has been distributed to departments across Maine to purchase PPE extractors, smoke exhaust systems, and more. This initiative was driven by the hard work and passion of Stephen Bunker—Farmington Firefighter, MFSI State Fire Instructor, and Maine State Representative serving on the Criminal Justice and Public Safety Committee.

Training & Education Support: Under the leadership of Chief Dan Brooks and the Commission's Training & Education Subcommittee, financial steps have been taken to reimburse the City of Auburn for its upgraded Live Fire Training Facility. This investment directly strengthens fire service training opportunities statewide. Additionally, the Fire Commission is working with the City of Bangor for an updated facility, Yarmouth for repairs and Farmington for some upgrades for a second egress off the second floor.

Recruitment and Retention: Retired Chief Larry Willis shared insights on the successful development of the EMCC Fire Science program in Bangor, which has established a robust live-in student initiative that bolsters regional departments and enhances recruitment efforts.

Comprehensive Statewide Staffing Study: State Fire Marshal Shawn Esler is actively collaborating with community partners and his team on an extensive statewide firefighter staffing study. This vital data will influence future decisions, so we strongly encourage everyone to engage in these surveys to contribute to a well-equipped future.

Wildland Fire Protection Efforts: Chief Robby Gross and the Maine Forest Service team discussed the challenges of the current fire season. They provided updates on the online burn permit system and highlighted ongoing community and state agency meetings aimed at ensuring preparedness.

Legislative Advocacy: Lawmakers such as Senator Chip Curry and Representative Scott Cyrway continue to robustly support the Maine Fire Service, advocating for commission initiatives and backing programs that advance our mission.

This collective effort demonstrates the strength of collaboration between fire service leaders, state officials, and legislators. Together, these actions are advancing the Maine Fire Service in real and meaningful ways. The 26 students were fully engaged in both the classroom and in the field. Each one of them was a real pleasure and an honor to teach."
